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## School orcharodestroyed by vandals

## Donors, volunteers will work to rebuild p**af**tPacific Elementary's "outdoor classroom"

January **2**, 2016(Sacramento) With the help of volunteers and community donations, a school orchard destroyed y vandals will be replanted on Saturdap rning (January 30).

Fourteenyoung fruit-bearing treeswere destroyed at Pacific Elementary School (620 ft 45t.) on November 15 Vandals ripped off branches and pulled tseteom the ground, dragging some ross campus. The orchard was only about a year old, installed in the fall of 2014 by the group Common Visions in partnership with The California Endownth, Soil Born Farms and SCUSD.

"The destruction of our garden was destating to our students," said Principal Oscar Garcia. "The kids had tended the trees, watched them grow and were looking forward tongatesh fruit. And then overnight, it was gone."

Discouraged but undaunted, tudents rallied to tant new trees and created <u>aoFundMe campaign</u> with the hashtag #YouCan'tStopUsFromGrowing. <u>afflor</u> netted about \$2,885 in donations used to purchase new trees olunteers will plant the trees on Saturday, build a butterfly habitat and pick citrus from older neighborhood rees, among other school beautification projects.

In addition to providingresh snacks, fruit trees bring stability to a school garden. While traditional school gardens require a fair amount of <code>day</code>day maintenance, fruit tree orchards are low maintenanceTogether with Pacific's school gardene replanted orchard will see an outdor classroom where students can learbout such topics abotany and environmental sustainability.
